THE CATHOLIC ORIGINS OF HALLOWEEN

'Halloween" comes from an old English word for "holy"..."Hallow". We still use this word in the Lord's Praver when we say 'Hallowed be thy name." And then "evening" which is

also same as "eve". So, Halloween means...All Hallows Eve: All Saints Evening. With time, "Hallows evening" was contracted to "Halloween".

It is celebrated on 31st October because in the Catholic Church, an important celebration was anticipated the evening before the feast itself. Since All Saints was celebrated on 1st November, the evening before that, 31st October, celebrations for the Saints began with Halloween. All Saints Evenina.

All Saints Day itself, as a feast, was not always celebrated on 1st November. It was moved to 1st November by the Pope in the eighth century to coincide with the date a chapel inside the old St. Peter's Basilica (the current St. Peter's Basilica is built on the ruins of the original) dedicated to All the Saints was consecrated. Thus, the Catholic Church is the reason why Halloween is celebrated on October 31, on the eve of the Solemnity of All Saints.

Halloween is not a pagan or secular celebration at all. It comes from a rich religious background. People would dress up in various costumes to depict the Saints because that was their evening before their celebration the following day. Unfortunately, the secular world, as usual, as the devil always trys to make an imitation, a fake copy of the original of what is God's, has tried to twist the beautiful, spiritual meaning of this holy evening before All Saints Day by depicting images of the dead and horrific figures which is actually not what Halloween was and is.

May All the Saints pray for us.

"And 'to love him with all your heart, with all your understanding, with all your strength, and to love your neighbor as yourself' is worth more than all the burnt offerings and sacrifices." (Mark 12:33)

Of all the gifts that God gives us, the one He wants the most is our heart. He wants us to share out of our love for Him, not out of obligation. Using our talent in parish ministry and contributing money to support our parish mission is important, but it's more important to spend time in prayer with God daily and discern how He is calling us to be generous with all of our gifts. Not just the visible ones, but the invisible ones like love, mercy and forgiveness.



In May of this year the wooden cross in front of our church blew over. We want to replace it and the idea has been proposed that it be made of metal so as to have a long life. The metalworking teacher at Dr Martin LeBoldus High School is excited to help us craft the new symbol; to do that we need a design and that's where you come in.

We are calling upon the parishioners of St Anne's to create a design for a cross to be installed on the front lawn approximately where the previous cross was located. As such it needs to be large enough to have presence in the large grassed area and be visible from Cowan Crescent. The other criteria is that it be fabricated of metal, probably steel or aluminum, likely not bronze. The design can be as abstract or detailed as you want to make it. Structural comments and support can be provided by Kelly Nelson, co-lead of the buildings and grounds team.
